Example Projects

In-Scope:

- Investments in larger-scale educational projects (e.g., improvements to a teaching garden)
- Long-lived classroom equipment (e.g., library books and upgrades, sports equipment, arts and crafts equipment, musical instruments)
- Educational software (e.g., IXL Platform, Quizlet, Canvas)
- Teaching supplements (e.g., field trips to zoos / museums / cultural centers, speaker events)

Out of Scope:

- Consumable items (e.g., food and snacks, fuel cards, gift cards, PPE / medical supplies)
- Teacher salaries and / or bonuses, including reimbursements for teach-from-home items
- Funding for student-led groups (purpose of grant is for teachers)

Case Study - Drama Set

<u>Purpose:</u> Creating large scenery "flats" on wheels that serve as the backdrop for plays, musicals, and shows throughout the year.

Funds Requested: \$993

Post-Project Report from Teacher and Project Leader:

By being part of these musicals, students <u>gained a sense of</u>
<u>accomplishment and pride, knowing that they were part of a</u>
<u>well-supported production</u> with high-quality sets, enhancing both their confidence on stage and their appreciation for the arts.

All together, just this year, the sets were used for a total of NINE performances! <u>They can be repainted and reused again and again for many years and shows to come!</u>

Best of all, the students not only had the opportunity to benefit from seeing and using beautiful sets, they also had the opportunity to WORK DIRECTLY on the sets through the construction, prep and painting process.





Case Study - Science Programming

<u>Purpose:</u> Inviting the Palo Alto Junior Museum to provide supplemental lessons to rebuild the science education curriculum.

Funds Requested: \$1,680

Post-Project Report from Teacher and Project Leader:

The Junior Museum delivered hands-on and interactive programming at our school site, aligned to NGSS standards and tailored to match our non-fiction ELA unit topics. Each lesson was 50-minutes and <u>involved</u> <u>engaging</u>, <u>tactile science experiences (such as live animals</u>, <u>natural artifacts</u>, <u>and real science tools</u>).

Case Study - Musical Instruments

<u>Purpose:</u> Purchase new instruments for the school's growing band program and replace old instruments that were breaking

Funds Requested: \$5,400

Post-Project Report from Teacher and Project Leader:

The Special EPAK Grant has helped our scholars begin to <u>utilize a</u> <u>variety of quality instruments that were not accessible to them previously.</u>

Scholars have learned instrument care (responsibility) and maintaining excellent instrument quality. <u>Utilizing our new instruments has instilled a sense of pride and has even brought in new musicians! Our small band program of 12 has now grown to 27!</u>

Students are practicing daily at home and are excited to grow their musicianship skills. We are now working towards two events that we will be performing at this current school year.



Case Study - Playground & Shade

<u>Purpose:</u> Increase the shade available in the playground area so students can better enjoy lunch and recess time and to purchase new games and sports equipment for student recreation.

Funds Requested: \$5,000

Post-Project Report from Teacher and Project Leader:

We are so excited to report that this grant beyond met our expectations.

[Our contractor] installed two new metal poles to <u>double the shaded area that</u> we had outside. He replaced the old shade screen and he added a sand flooring (where previously it was just a mudhole with the rain). <u>Many kids</u> have already been sitting under the screen and enjoying the space, across the grade levels.

The board games have been used to help support our Friday Specials classes when we work with three classes at a time ... The games will also be used by our Garden teacher to support her with indoor classes when the weather is rainy or too cold, and still promote collaboration and joy.
